Summer Is Here – What Are You Waiting For?

Summer is definitely upon us now. I know, technically Summer arrives on June 21st, but as far as I'm concerned once daytime temperatures are in the mid-80s(F) for several days in a row – there is no such thing as Spring, it's Summer! This year Summer arrived as though someone had simply opened a door. One morning the temperature was hovering near freezing and the next – birds were singing, the azaleas burst open in bloom, the thermometer bumped up to 80 and we had to throw the switch on the air conditioning from 'heat' to 'cool'! On the plus side: I always like being able to go outside in shorts and no shoes instead of long pants and a jacket. The downside: My electric bill pretty much stays the same. That's season changes in east central Florida for you!

Last month's meeting -

Our own Linda Stagnol (a former president of FECBS, by the way) presented a very interesting program on some novel potting mixes (of which she brought many examples to show to our members) and growing techniques that she has found to work well for her. I think that everyone was intrigued by her experiment using hydroponics blended with a fish tank for

some of the smaller varieties of bromeliads. She's clearly had some good results from her unconventional techniques, as evidenced by those beautiful (and large!) Cryptanthus varieties that she showed to the group. I hope you noted her comment that "if you can grow African violets, you can grow Cryptanthus" – that's not something you often hear concerning the epiphytic bromeliads, but for those earthbound varieties with extensive root systems like the Cryptanthus, this is good advice indeed.

Also at the meeting, Joanne from the Volusia County Orchid Society spoke about the upcoming Mothers Day show. We have been invited to have a static display (table-

top display on 8' table) during this event and will discuss this in more detail at the next meeting (April).

I always enjoy the 'Show and Tell' portion of our meetings. You never know what interesting bromeliad will be brought in and discussed by our members. Last month Joan Campbell (another former president of FECBS!) brought in a nice example of Billbergia 'Collevii' in bloom. This is an interesting small Billbergia hybrid that according to the BSI Cultivar Registry (BCR) is the product of a cross of B. amoena and B. vittata (two Billbergia species plants) done by Van Geert way back in 1882.



Joan Campbell with Billbergia 'Collevii' at the March meeting An interesting comment in the BCR is that it is felt that the original 'Collevii' is probably no longer in cultivation and that what is seen today is likely an F2, the result of growing out seeds from the original plant (which introduces some variability) rather than continuing the 'pure' line from offsets. Of course, it may just be that Joan has that rare true 'Collevii'...in any event, an interesting plant to bring to 'Show and Tell'.

Out and about....

Bill reported on the Water Wise Fair in New Smyrna Beach in early March. Once again our club was invited to participate (4th consecutive year!) and many thanks are due to Bill Hazard, Bryan Manion, and Virginia Dornbach for manning the FECBS booth there. There was a lot of interest in bromeliads expressed by those attending this

event, plant sales were brisk...and so was the wind. They had quite a difficult time keeping the plants from blowing off the sales table!

Not every plant you get blooms in the first year or two (or three) as is evidenced with this Androlaechmea Cyclops. Received from Mike Michalski (not sure if I purchased it or he gave it to me) at the 2012 World Bromeliad Conference in Orlando. I repotted it a couple of times and then finally it spiked this past winter. I covered it and moved it several times causing a little damage but was very pleased with it overall, so much that I moved it to my front door area. The colorful pink/orange leaves are a welcome sign of spring.

What is that thing?

This time of year you may notice a bright pink bloom emerging from a cluster of viciously-spined green leaves arranged around a medium sized bromeliad. Back in the late 1800's someone saw one of these plants in bloom and thought that it resembled a turtle's head (a rather imaginative observation – I wonder what strange creatures he thought he saw in those puffy cumulus clouds overhead?) and gave the name of *Quesnelia testudo* (Latin for 'tortoise') to this plant.



Quesnelia testudo's bright blooms are a welcome Spring sight. Note the blue flowers that peek out from the bright pink bracts on the inflorescence in the photo above. Closely related is the somewhat larger Quesnelia quesneliana.

How do you tell them apart? This plant, at least in my yard, blooms at the same time as its cousin, but has a more wavy, satiny appearance to the inflorescence with bracts that are a little darker than Q. testudo.

If you really want to tell the two apart, you need to get close enough to observe the bracts on the bloom. Quesnelia testudo's bracts covering the stalk of the inflorescence each terminate in a stiff, sharp spine. There are some good photos on the FCBS website showing this. On Quesnelia quesneliana... not so much - its bracts are soft and floppy.

Both of these plants are extremely hardy and shrug off extreme heat and extreme cold with little noticeable stress. Grow them in full sun: the plant becomes more compact and the leaves are pale green. Grow them in shade – longer leaves and a darker green. Neither is very particular about growing conditions and both are so spiny that you are not likely to brush against them more than once. In fact, just about the time that you decide that you've had enough of these tough customers and are going to rip them out of the ground and dispose of the bodies, they reward you with a really nice bloom...and you decide to put off getting rid of them for another year!

Halifax Council of Garden Clubs

Although FECBS is no longer a member of the Council of Garden Clubs of the Halifax Area, I have continued to attend their monthly meetings and thought you might want to know what they've been up to recently. Chris Taliafaro has been very diligent in seeing that the property is kept up. She has had the large bay tree that died in the back yard removed, the roofing tiles repaired, the house has been repainted, and she is working now on getting the shutters repaired/replaced. One of the few 'worker bees' in that organization, Chris has been doing a great job.

The garage sale in February brought in approximately \$1700 (should help to offset at least some of the house upkeep costs). They have also taken the first steps towards obtaining non-profit 501c3 status, although they have been told that this may take up to 9 months before this status is awarded(a bit like having a baby?).

On the negative side, no vendors have been secured for Everybody's Flower Show, so it's unlikely that they will offset expenses incurred there. No newsletter has been printed for several months because no one has provided any news to the editor. And, finally, the nominating committee had no volunteers to serve as officers for the upcoming year – although it looks like they may get some less than willing club members to take on those spots following a brisk discussion at their March meeting.

Another benefit is that of an aesthetically pleasing appearance to our setup, which isn't always the best in New Smyrna due to the ever present windy conditions which makes for a challenging event.

United Brethren in Christ has a food pantry which helps out many that are less fortunate than most of us. Last year they gave away close to 500,000 meals, that's no small task! We can show our appreciation by donating non-perishable food items to their food pantry. You can help by bringing your donations to our April F.E.C.B.S. meeting and Bill Hazard and I will pass them on to U.B.I.C. on behalf of our club for their food pantry.
