This month's meeting – The Genus Ananas

Most people don't realize this, but many years ago there was a thriving commercial farming operation in Volusia county growing pineapples. Unfortunately, a virus showed up in the early 1900s that affected the plants so badly that it was no longer feasible to grow these plants commercially and farmers moved on to other, less troublesome crops. We hope that the "red wilt" root problem is a thing of the past because pineapples really do grow very well in this area – particularly when we have relatively mild winters like this last one (thank you global warming!) and they are becoming quite a common site in people's yards. Few fruits are as tasty as a home-grown pineapple when it has fully ripened and we're going to show you how to

get your own pineapple started during this month's meeting.
