Plant Profile – What's in a name?...

I've always been interested in the origins of bromeliad names and, for me it's almost like reading a good mystery novel when I find that one of my tags is marked wrong and I eventually track down the correct name for that plant. This month's plant profile might be called "*the case of the bogus Billbergia*".

Many years ago I was given a Billbergia with its plant tag labelled as "B. Manda's Othello". I've never had very many Billbergias in my collection and hadn't studied them very closely, so when I was given this very dark leaved plant, I automatically took the name to be correct and didn't give it another thought...until years later when I came across a plant labelled "Manda's Othello" on a sales table. This plant didn't look much like mine of the same name and I automatically (and *arrogantly*, I might add) assumed <u>my</u> plant was named correctly and this one was not! At any rate, I purchased the imposter and looked forward to tracking down its rightful name.

At about that same time, my old plant came into bloom, as it did each February (some bromeliads are such reliable bloomers that you can predict just when they'll put up their bloom spike!), but this time I looked a little closer at the flowers and noticed that they were uniformly dark blue. The leaves on the plant were very dark, almost black, with some faint scurfy banding on the undersides and very small teeth along the leaf edges. Leaf tips slowly tapered to a point and barely curled outward – where leaves on my newly acquired plant, besides having much larger and more widely spaced teeth, rather abruptly ended in a pinched tip. They were also decidedly dark red with scattered cream colored spotting. Butcher's photo of 'Manda's Othello' on the FCBS website didn't show the bloom for this plant, but several uncredited pictures on the BSI Cultivar Registry showed that the flowers on 'Manda's Othello' were green and only the tips were blue –a light blue. Hmmm...!

I had to wait until November of the following year before my newly acquired B. 'Manda's Othello' put up a bloom spike and both it and the plant itself looked exactly like the photos on the two websites. Half the mystery was solved – it was my plant from 20 years ago that was incorrectly labelled! The new plant was, indeed, 'Manda's Othello'. But now, what was the I.D. of my old plant?

It was at a judged bromeliad show that I noticed an entry of a Billbergia with uniformly dark leaves that resembled mine quite closely. It wasn't in bloom, but I jotted down the name of the plant and at my first opportunity, searched for its picture on the FCBS site. The photo there by Herb Plever looked very much like the plant in the show and like my old plant, but Mike Wisnev's pictures of the bloom of Billbergia 'Nita' on the BSI site really solved the mystery and confirmed that this was indeed the plant I was given nearly 20 years ago...and that was mislabeled!

For those of you interested in such things: Billbergia 'Manda's Othello' is quite an old hybrid, registered in 1973 but possibly dating back to the early 1950s and described as a possible cultivar of Billbergia saundersii or hybrid. Billbergia 'Nita' is a Beadle hybrid, named for Don's mother, and is the product of crossing B. vittata with B. 'Caliente' (another Beadle hybrid). 'Nita' was registered in 1984.

If there is a lesson to be learned here, I guess it's that there are always bromeliads in circulation out there that have incorrect names on their tags. In this case there was a wrong name from 20 years ago and one that I would have unknowingly perpetuated if it hadn't been for those wonderful resources – the BSI and FCBS websites!
