PROGRAM FOR JULY 16 MEETING SPEAKER: DR. TERESA MARIE COOPER New Events in Mexican Weevil Research



Our speaker at the July meeting will be Dr Teresa Cooper, researcher, who will talk about the latests events in her research to deal with the destructive Mexican weevil in Florida.

Dr. Cooper is an entomologist, conservationist, and artist. From 2001 to 2016 she was at the University of Florida, first as a graduate student (Gainesville, Florida) then as a Research Scientist (Ft. Pierce, Florida). During this time, she

concentrated on one goal: saving Florida's bromeliads from an invasive bromeliadeating weevil, Metamasius callizona. Until 2015, great efforts were made by Dr. Cooper and her colleagues to control the weevil using classical biological control; ultimately, it was not successful. Now, several of Florida's bromeliads may be endangered because of the weevil. In 2015, Dr. Cooper began the Save Florida's Bromeliads Conservation Project to promote intensive conservation efforts to keep Florida's bromeliads alive.

SEPARATING PUPS Reprinted from FECBS Journal June 2014 By Jay Thurrott

When is a good time to separate bromeliad pups? When should we repot existing bromeliads – either to a larger potsize or just to replace the "worn-out" potting mix? When are the oak tree leaves finally going to stop falling into my bromeliads so I can clean all of the fallen debris out of the leaf axils? That time is here! It's summertime and if you plan your workdays in the garden so that you can avoid the mid-day heat of Florida's summer, you can accomplish a lot in the garden. Summer in Florida is when our bromeliads are in their most active growth period and you can take advantage of that in many ways. First, if you have always wanted to try your hand at mounting a bromeliad on a favorite piece of driftwood, this is the perfect time to do it. A well mounted plant now will set its roots into the wood much more quickly than at other times of the year and in a very short time you should have a beautiful epiphytic display that will appear to have been growing on that wood for most of its life. Just be sure to start out with a young plant – older, more mature bromeliads are less likely to produce new roots for attachment.
