Program

Phil Elting, of Elting's Exotic Plants nursery in Riverview, Florida, will give a presentation on *The Three P's of Bromeliads: Potting, Popping, and Propagation*. A native of Tampa, Mr. Elting has been growing bromeliads, orchids, and plumeria for almost 40 years. He has 40,000 square feet of greenhouse and shade house operations, 90 per cent of which is used for growing bromeliads. He grows Vriesea, Guzmania and Tillandsia and specializes in tissue culture and hybridizing Vriesea. Most of his production has gone to Europe. Phil has greenhouses in both Riverview and Costa Rica, and he was one of the vendors at the Bromeliad Extravaganza our society hosted last September.

Ask-an-Expert Feature

Have a bromeliad questions? Need help with the name of a plant, where to put it in the garden, how much sun or shade to give it, or a diagnosis of why it looks unhealthy? At the February meeting we are introducing a new feature: Ask an Expert. During the refreshment break one of our more knowledgeable members will be seated at the Ask-an-Expert table and available for these and similar questions you might have. This month it will be Barret Bassick. If you bring in examples to demonstrate your query, be sure they are clean and dry.

LAST MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

Ray LeMieux of Tropiflora Nursery in Sarasota gave us pointers how to identify 17 different bromeliad genera and their growing conditions. As usual, Ray had with him a lot of examples to demonstrate each of the genera he talked about, at least one of which he had pulled from his front yard just before the meeting.

He reminded us bromeliads do best in well-drained soil, and recommended a soil mixture that is a combination of peat moss, perlite, and pine bark chips and occasionally some mulch. He also suggested that when removing bromeliads from pots and placing them directly into the ground the soil around the plants should be amended with mulch to allow better drainage around the plants.



For control of pests such as scale and weevils Ray recommended the use of the insecticide imidacloprid (found in Bayer Advanced plant care products). To reduce the occurrence of scale, plants should not be crowded closely, and deceased mother plants should be removed as soon as possible. For controlling snails he suggested the use of liquid Sevin, and for both snails and slugs he suggested a slug bait insecticide product.




