What's blooming in your yard?

It's Winter and around here that usually means that you should check on your Billbergias because, heaven knows – their blooms are so short-lived that if you blink twice, the bloom may be over! I had hoped that these plants would hold off long enough for me to bring them in for "show and tell" at the next meeting, but they seem have a mind of their own when it comes to the time for them to bloom – and that's why it is so unusual to see a Billbergia in bloom at a bromeliad show. Anyway, here's a few that were blooming when I began working on this newsletter:



Billbergia leptopoda. I got this plant from Boggy Creek Bromeliads back in 1993 and it rewards me each year with a brief bloom. The bloom is something less than spectacular, but foliage is so attractive that I can forgive the small inflorescence.



Billbergia 'L.O.L."

This is an unregistered Marty Baxley hybrid that was given to me last February. This is the first time that I have seen it bloom.

Not only is this an attractive plant with its red foliage, it's also spineless so I like this plant almost as much as the Tillandsioideae group!

OK – it's not a Billbergia, but this little plant has a terrific looking bloom and I'm sure it will be faded by the time we have our January meeting. What else does this plant have to make it attractive? It tolerates bright sun and high temperatures in the Summer and is very cold tolerant in the Winter!
