Aechmea gamosepala, or matchstick, is a perfect landscape plant. It produces large clumps and is tolerant of sunny areas if kept well watered. The flowers can be cut and used in arrangements.

Greg Wilson's bromeliad tower

Greg explains: I started with four interlocking orange trellis pieces (two for each side) that a friend gave me and spray painted them black. I made a tube from chicken wire for the center and made a tower,

joining the trellis pieces on each side with zip ties (see photo below). I then filled the tube with Spanish moss, sealed the ends and added the bromeliads.
