### Colder temperatures are on the way...

It is time to think about preparing your bromeliad collections for colder temperatures. The first thing to do is find out which of your plants can survive under various temperatures. The Florida Council of Bromeliad Societies <a href="www.fcbs.org">www.fcbs.org</a> contains several articles that may help: Cold Sensitivity of Bromeliads compiled by Dr. Dale W. Jenkins (1998) and Cold Sensitivity of Some Bromeliads by Tom Wolfe & Eileen Kahl (2007). Get that frost cloth ready!!!

### **Monthly Feature:**

<u>Vriesea</u>: Native to Central and South America, this genus is comprised of mostly tank-type plants. Many are small to medium varieties, but some are quite large. Since most are true epiphytes they have little in the way of a root system. Their smooth leaves are typically long, broad and flat and do not have spines or points.

Vriesea inflorescences are typically very long-lasting and may be highly decorative in color such as *Vriesea splendens*. Flowers range from yellow, red, orange, pink, purple and even speckled. They are tolerant of different light conditions, but will only bloom if they have bright filtered sunlight. Usually species with softer green leaves need less light than those with stiff or patterned foliage which need stronger light. Even though they look delicate, many tend to be very cold hardy.

If you grow them in pots, be sure to use a fast-draining soil to prevent rotting. Fertilizer with a granular fertilizer March to October. Pups appear in the center of Vrieseas and feed off the mother plant until they have developed roots to survive on their own.

<u>Wallisia</u>: In case you have *Tillandsia cyanea*, it has been reclassified as *Wallisia cyanea*.



(Jane Villa-Lobos)

<u>Wittrockia</u>: Named after Swedish botanist, Veit Brecher Wittrock, this genus is native to Central and South America. The long, glossy leaves are armed with sharp spines and form a rosette. Their inflorescence is shaped like a tulip and blooms deep in the vase.

Wittrockia cyathiformis is endemic to the



Atlantic coastal rainforests of southeastern Brazil.
