News from the Membership Committee




Got neighbors?

Death of Dr. Robert E. Benway March 4, 2014

Dr. Robert E. Benway, October 25, 1931 - March 4, 2014, Temple Terrace, Florida

Robert Emphy Benway, MD

Robert "Bob" Emphy Benway, 82, of Temple Terrace died on March 4, 2014. Dr. Benway was born on October 25, 1931 in St. Louis, Mo to the late Emphy Frank and Euvera Stephens Benway. He graduated from Miami Senior High School in 1949 and received his BA and medical degree from the University of Miami in 1953 and 1957, respectively.

Following completion of medical school, he was commissioned as an officer in the Army Medical Corps. Leaving active duty after seven years, he settled in Durham, NC with his first wife, the late Marguerite Blanks. He moved to Tampa in 1972, and married Paula Kirby in 1976.

Dr. Benway was the first Chief of Anesthesia at the James A. Haley Veterans Administration Hospital (VAH), after having had that role at the Durham VAH. He was instrumental in the development of the VA's automated surgical computer system while at the Tampa VAH. He held an appointment as a professor of Anesthesia at both Duke University and the University of South Florida. Finally, he completed his service to his country after 28 years, retiring as a Colonel in the Army Reserves.

He is survived by his loving wife, Paula and his three children: Catherine Benway of Miami, FL; Bob Benway (Maureen) of Richmond, VA; and Valerie Benway Ely (Aaron), of Temple Terrace, FL. He is also survived by four grandchildren: Matthew; Mikaela; Connor (Bob and Maureen); and Aaralyn (Valerie and Aaron).

The family would like to gratefully acknowledge the superior attention and care that he was provided by the physicians and staff of the James A. Haley Veterans Administration Hospital during three years of illness.

Under the very capable and enthusiastic guidance of Mrs. Beryl Allen, who acts as the director, several such Robins are winging their way around the United States and also as far away as South Africa. What do the members do? Here is what Mrs. Allen says: "You would be surprised, we have rules, just as a society in your city would have; we grow and study bromeliads, we talk plants and history, we visit, we give and exchange ideas, some times

seeds and what nots, we are a closely knit bunch in both Robins. I do not accept

as a member any person who can join a society in his or her own vicinity. I will tell you a secret — I would not change places for any office in any society, I have my Bromeliad Robins, and I sincerely hope they can say the same thing about their director." BROMELIAD PERSONALITY BERYL ALLEN OF TAMPA

Mrs. Beryl N. Allen has been a very active member of the Bromeliad Society since its beginning and of the Tampa Bay Bromeliad Guild since its formation in 1963.

When I first visited Mrs. Allen we walked about her many plants with pencil and paper, for her hearing aid was not functioning that day. We had become acquainted through the Society's Round Robins, of which she is chairman. She has kept as many as fifteen Robins going at one time—in the United States, Africa, Australia, New Zealand, Japan, etc. And what a job this is, especially trying to locate lost and delayed Robins.

Although she is 79 years old, she keeps very busy caring for her home and hundreds of bromeliads and other plants in her small backyard, which includes a large slathouse and a lean-to greenhouse. She lives alone with her big black poodle dog, Sable, who is good company but hard on the plants. Just now she is in the midst of potting up some 300 seedlings. She is also taking an evening refresher course in

gardening and landscaping at the courthouse. She entertains many out-of-town growers and keeps up a terrific correspondence with people all over the world, in addition to the Round Robins.



Mrs. Allen has been a widow since 1962. While running a small commercial nursery, she cared for an invalid husband for fifteen years and raised nine children and two grandchildren. She has so many great grandchildren she has lost count. She says they have "all turned out very well." Is it any wonder with such a mother? She and her husband, who was a railroad man, came to Florida in 1926 with six children in a 1914 Ford with a makeshift trailer attached behind it. Her father was a newspaperman back in Iowa where she grew up and married, so she comes by her love of writing quite naturally.

She started growing bromeliads in 1947 with the gift of an *Aechmea caudata* var. *variegata* and soon began adding them to her nursery stock. Later she began to grow them from seed sent to her from all over. Lee More, the collector, even named a bromeliad that he had collected in South America for her—*Aechmea Beryl Allen*. She gave up most of her commercial nursery some years ago; now she concentrates on bromeliads, although she still has hundreds of begonias and other plants in her greenhouse, having been an active member of the Begonia Society almost since its organization. Bromeliads Down Under (Excerpts from BSI Journal 1984 V34(3) Olwen Ferris

I have many people to thank for the plants in my collection and for the knowledge so ungrudgingly shared with me over the years.

In the early years of the Bromeliad Society of Australia I was asked if I would take over the running of our Seed Bank. I had read somewhere of a round robin among gesneriad growers in the United States and started robins among our bromeliad seed growers. This activity eventually reached the ears of Mrs. Beryl Allen of Tampa, Florida, who wrote asking to join with us. Imagine my surprise when I found that she was the person who had started the gesneriad round robin and later the bromeliad round robins in the United States.

Beryl and I corresponded until her death, swapping seeds and ideas. She sent me a few seeds of *Dyckia encholirioides* gathered for her in the wilds by someone who saw a magnificent clone, much taller and darker in colour than the rest of the plants which were growing over a fairly large area. This plant starts to flower at the top of the tall, branched inflorescence and has ripe seed before the last of the branches have finished their blaze of orange-red petals. The collector could see the petal colour when he harvested the seed from the top of the inflorescence. From seven seeds only one grew to maturity and the first offset was given to Grace Goode in Queensland. When we moved to southeast Queensland from Sydney, some plants were left to be picked up the following week. Only one plant was stolen and this was *Dyckia encholirioides* in a large decorative pot. We visited Grace after settling in and were given a large section from the original offset. This prospered in our new garden and flowered, fitting the description given with the seed. The branched inflorescence was over two meters high. One family noted the date of the flowering and timed their visits to coincide with the annual flowering.
