The genus *Aechmea* has the most diversity in form and inflorescences of all bromeliads. Size ranges from a few inches to nine feet in diameter (*Ae. conifera*); growth habit may be upright and tubular or an open rosette. Leaves may be soft or rigid; plain or scurffed; one solid color or bicolored; barred, striped, or mottled. The leaves of all species in this genus have teeth; however there are some spineless cultivars (such as 'Eileen', 'DeLeon', 'Frederike' and 'Maya').

Generally the inflorescence is on a long scape, although in some *Aechmeas* it does not rise above the throat of the bromeliad. The form of the inflorescence itself is varied: branched, cylindrical, or globular; erect or pendant. After blooming, the often long-lived inflorescence will produce berries; seeds are carried inside a gel-like substance.

[Excerpt From:] Searching For Glorious Guzmanias

Racine and I made it a collecting goal when we spent six months in Colombia in 1946. We looked far and wide for a favorable spot around Ocana, where Wallis had found it and where he had lost his life, in search of this Guzmania *musaica*, but the mountains, once a lush jungle were now nude and dry. From one section to another we went by horseback, by truck and on foot. For days we searched and finally gave up. To add to the difficulties involved, a precious book of Traveler's Checks joggled out of my pocket while wrestling with the horse over a steep trail. Or they may have been lost when I climbed up into a tree using the horse's back to reach the first limb where lodged a bromeliad. My horse did not seem to approve of this effort and sauntered off just as I was dangling in mid-air. Finally, I was able to take a specimen of Aechmea pubescens from high up in the tree and then spent five frantic minutes beating

off hundreds of frantic, disturbed ants which literally covered me; possibly it was there that I lost our very much needed Traveler's Checks whose absence was discovered only much later. In disappointment that day we gave up hopes of finding the coveted *G. musaica*.

Two weeks later, however, on our way to the oil fields, we spied a tree trunk covered with just what we were looking for, G. musaica, but it was at dusk and we dared not linger, then, along the way as the fierce Motilone Indians haunted this area making it unsafe to be out even in the day time, not to mention after dark. All windows and doors in the cabins were covered with hardware cloth to prevent arrows from entering. All night I dreamed of those plants; at six in the morning I rushed out into the jungle and found the tree I had seen the day before. There, like a feast awaiting the hungry, were ten beautiful plants of G. musaica encircling the tree trunk in a spiral vine-like rhythm on their long stolons . . . and they were in flower! It was a rewarding sight, well worth all the discomforts and disappointments of the miles of dangerous searching.

HELP NEEDED: Sign up at the February or March meetings or contact Eloise Beach. We need workers to sell & bag plants (easy- no experience required), to answer simple questions about our club & bromeliads, and to operate the cash register. Save bags & boxes for packing plants. We usually need extra help on Saturday morning.

If you want to sell extra bromeliads from your collection, you must sign up by the March meeting. 25% of your gross sales will be deducted as a donation to BSCF. You will have to work a minimum of 4 hours and bring your own table, if you want one. Your bromeliads must be properly labeled, clean, in good condition, and be free from insects or disease. NO SCALE! Plants will be inspected by the Florida Dept. of Agriculture. Potted plants should be well rooted. You may also sell mounted or bare root plants. Set up is usually on Friday afternoon. Copies of the official Sale Rules will be available at the February meeting and will be published in the March newsletter.

Baking With Bromeliads

Honey Mustard Chicken

1 can (20 oz) pineapple slices in juice 4 boneless, skinless chicken breast halves Salt and pepper to taste 2 large cloves garlic, pressed 1 t. thyme, crumbled 2 t. vegetable oil 1 T. cornstarch 1/4 cup honey 1/4 cup Dijon mustard

Drain pineapple, reserve juice.

Sprinkle chicken with salt and pepper to taste. Rub with garlic and

thyme. Brown in hot oil in nonstick skillet.

Combine 2 T. reserved juice with cornstarch.

Combine honey and mustard. Stir into skillet with remaining juice. Spoon sauce over chicken. Cover, simmer for 15 minutes.

sauce over chicken. Cover, similier for 13 influtes.

Stir cornstarch mixture into pan juices. Add pineapple. Cook, stirring until sauce boils and thickens.

Serves 4.

NOUN: Any of various tropical American bromeliads of the genus Aechmea, grown indoors

for their attractive, often patterned leaves and showy bracts.

ETYMOLOGY: New Latin, from Greek aikhnt, point of a spear.

Aechmea

Established as a genus 1794. Now divided into 8 subgenera. Given the name because of the characteristically sharp points of the bracts covering the flower buds and of the sepals (Aechmea, from Greek aichme "spear tip"). Comprises nearly 200 species.

HABITAT: Grows epiphytically in the rain forests of Brazil and neighboring countries. Also grows on rock and as a terrestrial. Some grow in dry areas. CULTURE: Some species flourish in full sun, others in deep shade. Can tolerate dry periods (because of impounded water) but they do enjoy humidity and regular watering. Many of these grow well on rock (the stolons grow roots along the entire length).

CHARACTERISTICS:

Form: leaf rosette ranges from a narrow tube to a widely flaring vase.

<u>Leaves</u>: toothed; often marked with cross-banding or patterned spotting, ends are rounded but with a sharp tooth at the middle.

Bracts covering flowering scape vividly colored (red, pink, orange)

Inflorescence: Wide range of form: cylindrical, cone-like, panicle; upright or pendant.

 $\underline{Flowers:}\ small,\ ball-shaped\ even\ when\ open,\ opening\ small;\ flowers\ sometimes\ appear\ not\ to\ be\ open.$

Petals have two small flaps at the base.

<u>Fruits:</u> berries form beneath the flowers. Berries (sometimes very colorful) may last several months.

What's in the name? Names referring to:

entire plant: gracilis, "delicate," miniata "small"

leaves: angustifolia "narrow-leaved," dealbata "dusted with white," fasciata "barred," recurvata "bent or curved back, triangularis, "triangular", zebrina, "zebra-like stripes."

bracts: bracteata "having bracts," ornata "decorated"(refers to intense red bracts)

inflorescence: coelestis "bluish" (i.e. the flower), cylindrata "cylindrical", distichantha "flowers in two rows" filicaulis "threadlike stems," fulgens glowing" (in this case, red), gamosepala "sepals fused together, nudicaulis, "naked stem", penduliflora, "pendent flower"

Names denoting similarity to other plants: bambusoides, bromeliifolia, nidularioides, tillandsioides

<u>Name Change:</u> recently the genus Streptocalyx (18 species) was reclassified as Aechmea. The name streptocalyx is no longer in use.
