Annual March "Evil Weevil Auction Date: March 16th 2025 Place: Garden Council Building

It is March and the CBS will be hosting our annual Fund raising Auction at the Garden Council Building on Virginia Ave., Fort Myers. The money made benefits our Society and the Florida Council of Bromeliad Societies.

We split the money made after expenses with the CBS and the Florida Council of Bromeliad Societies, who uses it to help to continue research and the eradication of the Mexican Weevil, also known as the "Evil Weevil". For over 2 1/2 decades the CBS has been a major contributor to the fight against this weevil, which is decimating native bromeliads in habitat in our State and the bromeliads in our collections. The weevil is in our environment, our gardens and if you experienced screen damage from Hurricane Ian, Helene or Milton most likely it has sneaked into your collections. For the latest information and updates on how to combat this pest, go to www.FCBS.org.

Each year we ask the membership to donate nice plants and plant related items to be auctioned. These can include bromeliads, orchids, other tropical plants, tools, art work and collectibles. The items are split between a "silence auction" and a regular auction. This makes it possible for our members to bring in desirable, less expensive items as well as the possibly higher ticket items. All donations are appreciated. The more the better. There are always bargains to be had and we always have fun.

We do the auction in lieu of our March meeting. We still have refreshments, but no Sales, Program, Workshop, Show and Tell or Raffle. Please still bring food for the Break. Of course any and all items are appreciated and will help. The Society business is kept to a minimum. The following is the schedule we will try to keep to leave at a decent time.

11:30AM-12:00 Noon: The location will be the same as last year and the procedure will be similar. Volunteers should arrive at the LCFMGC building to begin setup of tables and chairs about 11:30 AM. Starting about then we need bodies to help in a variety of areas- Setup, record keepers, runners, people to fill out donation tags, holding area keepers and people to show the items and pass out the winners' successful winning stubs.

12:15-1:45PM: We will be accepting donations such as bromeliads, other tropical plants, bromeliad and gardening related items, books and art. Bromeliads should be clean and healthy and appropriately labeled. If you are unsure about the name ask other members for an ID. Certain items will be selected from donations for the SILENT AUCTION. All items will be numbered and labeled and will be displayed until the Auction begins. Please register for

your bidding number at this time. You can not bid in either Auction without a number.

1:15 PM- 2:15 PM: Refreshment Break This is the time for review of auction items and submission of bids for Silent Auction items, which will be set up on side tables. Each item will have a bidding sheet for you to write your bidding number and an offer. Bidders can continuously up the bid as they wish. Bidding will continue until the Silent Auction items are randomly selected and sold to the bidder who has bid the highest. Please bear with us, we will still be receiving donations and labeling them until about 1:45PM, so things may look like a mad house!

2:15 PM: We take our seats and the Auction will begin following a brief business meeting and/or announcements from our President. During the Auction, Silent Auction items will be randomly removed and the winner will be announced. Until an item is taken to the auctioneer who will announce the winner, you may continue to raise your written offer. The auctioneer will with the assistance of those who brought the item or other commentators, describe the item and auction off the items to the highest bidder during the regular Auction. After an item has been won it will be returned to a holding area or may be given directly to the winner. You will be given a claim stub with the price you bid and the item's number, immediately after you have won an item.

Conclusion of Auctions: At the completion of the auction you take your claim stubs to the cashiers and pay for your items with cash or check. After you have paid for your items, the claim stubs will need to be shown to the workers in the holding area...so hold on to them. Your items will be handed over to you if they haven't already been given to you when you won it. We ask that you help us avoid any confusion. We want everybody to get exactly what they have won as quickly as possible without mistakes. Please note that this year we will again be using a two part ticket; one part stays with the plant and the winning bidder receives one part immediately after winning the item, which they will need to claim their winnings. This makes it possible for bidders to check out early since you will know exactly what you owe by adding up you stubs; however, we encourage members to stay until the completion of the Auction when we will have several people available to check you out.

Please come to the Auction and have some fun while supporting the CBS and the FCBS with donations and the purchase of items. As in past years, 1/2 of the proceeds after expenses will be donated to the Florida Council of Bromeliad Societies. We have been generous donors for as long as I can remember. We are acknowledged by the FCBS as their number one Affiliate contributor to the Council's projects including the "Evil Weevil Eradication Program". We all can take much pride in this accomplishment.

General Meeting:

<u>Announcements:</u> Betty Ann Prevatt presented the report from our annual sale held in December 2024. Our total profit was \$1,970.00. We were able to continue our annual donation of \$1,000.00 to The Edison Ford Estates as a thank you for hosting us each year. We have a good relationship with Debbie Hughes, the horticulturist there. She was in attendance as a member of CBS but also to receive the funds we donated to the Edison.

We discussed and got general opinion from members about the April Birth-day party. The regular meeting date falls on Easter Sunday so we moved the party to April 27th and it will be held at The Fort Myers Lee County Garden Council Building, the site of our regular meetings. We will be taking a tour of the Edison Ford Estates Bromeliad Gardens during the party. Debbie will be retiring in 2025 and will be working for the Edison a couple of days each week solely to focus on the bromeliad gardens. We look forward to seeing them in April and as they continue to evolve under her care.

Workshop: Larry Giroux presented a beautiful slide show he put together called Bromeliads in Every Direction! In addition to featuring bromeliads in Guatemala, he focused on bromeliad collectors and hybridizers from Sam and Hattie Smith, Michael Kiehl and . He had photos from Grant Groves nursery from several years ago and from Lyle Bowen's beautiful gardens in Fort Myers. Buddy Singleton and Dean Fairchild were noted for their contributions as well.

<u>Program:</u> Jase Mellica presented his program about his new Neoregelia hybrids. He continues his work to create very sun tolerant, colorful neos for our Florida home gardens. He also featured his Bi-generic creation-a huge *Sincoregelia* that is currently about 5' across and has beautiful color. He starts the pups in a clear plastic cup (with drain holes in the bottom) so he can see the root development and will know when it's time to put it into a 5"-6" pot. He recommends Dynamite fertilizer for bromeliads and he fertilizes them every time he up-pots one. He doesn't fertilize his in ground plants.

Door Prizes: We had a couple of nice plants from Jase for our door prize. **Show and Tell:** Dale spoke about several billbergias that Dave Denholm brought. He also brought a few of his own hybrids that are colorful stoloniferous neos that will create a very nice mass planting and donated a couple to the raffle.

Raffle: We had about 10 very nice plants for the raffle. Larry was assisted

Minutes of the CBS General Meeting LC/FM Garden Council Building February 16th, 2025

Call to order: 1:12 by President Julie Stein In Attendance: 27; New Member: Meyer Berg.

General Meeting:

Announcements: Julie thanked all the folks who contributed Friendship Plants today, especially from Dale Kammerlohr. There are a huge number this month, which is great.

Dr. Larry Giroux announced that at our next month's meeting, we will hold our annual Auction when we raise money for the FCBS And their Mexican weevil eradication projects and our Society. He encouraged the members to donate some plants for this very important and fun event. Larry also asked if some members could arrive at 11:30 to help set up the tables and chairs and help organize the pre-auction arrangements.

The April Birthday Party will be held this year on April 27, because the regular meeting date falls on Easter. We will host this event right here at the Garden Center. More on this in the next newsletter.

Our new Library Chair, Vicky Chirnside, introduced our well-stocked library to the members and encouraged everyone to take advantage of it by checking out a book or two. Also anyone who has forgotten to return borrowed books, please return them so others can enjoy them.

This year's Extravaganza will be sponsored by the Seminole Bromeliad Society to take place in Kissimmee from September 26-27. Members can visit www.bromeliadx.com, to get the details and even sign up on-line.

Alex Bello shared that his society is hosting a huge Bromeliad Show and Sale the weekend of April 12th in Miami. He expects between 200-400 entries, some being student art work, something unique to this show.

Program: Alex Bello gave an illuminating presentation on *Billbergias*, showing many gorgeous slides. He is the President of the Miami Bromeliad Society, a long-time member of our group as well, and owns a large nursery with thousands of plants he sells all over the world, specializing in Skotak hybrids. Alex shared that he loves how *Billbergias* grow tall and elegant, with interesting banded and spotted leaves. While the flowers may be striking and unique, they only last a few days, but the leaves remain beautiful.

He advised us to grow *Billbergias* in a very an airy mix, and to "never, ever under no circumstances" fertilizer them, as they will become green and leggy. If this happens, however, you can remove the leafy leaves and wait for new pups to emerge. Once they are big enough, you can remove them and throw away the mother. The new pups should be properly colored.

According to Alex, the harder and tougher you grow *Billbergias*, the more colorful they become. They don't want to be too wet or too dry, grown in too much shade or too much sun. Apparently, the less pampering the better. Alex's preferred planting mix, should only be 10% soil, the rest made up of a typical orchid mix including "LECO balls or hydroponic balls" (a <u>L</u>ight-

weight Expanded Clay Aggregate).

Workshop: Dr. Larry Giroux presented an informative slide show on insects and related pests of bromeliads. Julie and Dale also contributed several observations on the subject. To start, aphids can be troublesome, attaching themselves to stems and flowers. They are so tiny they might not be noticed, but if your plant is smaller than expected, and not thriving, you may want to check for them. Another problem could be thrips which feed on the flowers and foliage, leaving them deformed and blotched. Spider mites are a more common problem; they will leave egg casings which will give you a clue they are present. Insecticidal soap is the best way to eliminate mites.

The most common insect to invade our bromeliads is scale, another sucking pest. You may see a black dot which is actually the insect encased and stuck to the leaf. Then they leave a yellow ring behind, which is another clue. You can scrap them off and then rinse the plant thoroughly to get rid of the eggs. Insecticides usually do not kill the adult scales, so apply only when the crawlers are present. Insecticidal soaps usually require 2-4 applications at 3-7 day intervals.

Mealybugs are a big problem for *Cryptanthus*, because they are terrestrials. It's another sucking insect that leaves a mark on the leaves. They are mostly in the roots, so you have to pay attention to how your plants look.

A systemic insecticide is the only sure cure. Sevin a topical agent is a safer choice than some others and although not as thorough if used every 3 months or so can keep pests at bay. Imidacloprid is the active agent in some systemic insecticides and is commonly used and is more affective in general against most pests. No matter what you may use, do not apply any product if your plants are flowering, as pollinators will be harmed.

Mexican weevils, native to southern Mexico, Guatemala, and Belize, were first detected in Florida in 1989 in Fort Lauderdale. They have since spread all the way up to Orlando. The insect will bore a hole in the body of the plant and the larvae will basically feed off the plant until it dies. Since they are so ubiquitous in our region the only way to control them is to grow your plants in an enclosed area such as a screen enclosure and isolate any new plants for two to three weeks prior to exposing them to your collection. Currently, the preferred systemic insecticide- Imidacloprid, seems effective in killing the larvae. Larry uses a combination of liquid Sevin and Imidacloprid about 3 times a year. Use protection, spray on windless days and not on flowering plants.

Door Prizes: Our door prizes this month were 3 large and gorgeous *Aechmea* "Forest Fire" plants donated by Debbie McPhail. She said these plants will take full sun and the inflorescences will last for months.

Show & Tell: Dale Kammerlohr presented about 20 plants for discussion.

Raffle: Larry Giroux assisted by Julie Stein and Dolly Dalton, gave away about 15 donated plants to the happy winners.
