
Our new meeting place is the Ft. Myers— Lee County Garden Council Building 2166 Virginia Ave. Fort Myers.

May Workshop

Separating Tillandsia Clumps

Although many Tillandsias appear more attractive and seem to grow better in clumps, many Tillandsias become overgrown and require that their grouping be broken apart and old mothers and dry and rotting leaves be removed. Very often plants will accomplish this on its own. However, prudent trimming and manual separation may be more beneficial. Besides providing the opportunity



to clean and reshape your plants, you also acquire healthy offsets to increase your collection or have available for sale.

At our next meeting Pete Diamond, Bruce McAlpin, Cate Peterson along with audience participants will demonstrate techniques for separating Tillandsia clumps. The membership is encouraged to bring in their own Tillandsias, which may need attention.

As mentioned above, some clumps of Tillandsias such as this ball of *Tillandsia ionantha*, hide the old mothers and old leaves and do not need to be separated. Photo by Larry Giroux

Although it was originally planned that Carole would be giving a program about Cryptanthus, at her suggestion, since we have recently had Stephen Hoppin present the same topic to us this past fall, Rick will step in and give a program of which he is all too familiar, i.e. Terrestrial Bromeliads.
