Speaker:

<u>Dennis Giardina</u> is the Everglades Regions Biologist for the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission's Invasive Plant Management Section and works with public and non-profit land managers on issues related to exotic plants and animals. His work has included the search for additional parasites of the Mexican bromeliad weevil that was introduced into Florida in the 1980s and has since spread across the southern portion of the state, decimating native bromeliad habitats and threatening hobbyists' collections. Dennis's talk will focus on his expedition to the volcanic heart of Guatemala in Fall 2006.

Workshop

Helga Tarver made a short, concise, informative presentation on *Ethnobotanical Uses of Bromeliads*. Major categories of cultural uses include: 1) religious adornments, 2) fences/barriers, 3) source of

fiber for ropes, nets, and mattress stuffing (Spanish moss), 4) food for humans, cattle, hogs, and poultry (using seeds, stems, fruit, inflorescence, leaves), and, 5) medicinal (for headaches, hemorrhoids, intestinal parasites, and antibiotic, absorbent bandages (Spanish moss)).

<u>Speaker</u>

Dennis Cathcart gave a talk on "Terrestrial and Lithophytic Bromeliads in Their Habitats" that was well documented with abundant pictures of bromeliads growing in their natural habitat, either in soil (terrestrial) or on rocks (lithophytes).
