Program

<u>Dr. Terrie Bert</u> will give a presentation on *Diving Even Further into Unusual Bromeliad Genera*, which is about uncommonly cultivated bromeliad genera starting with the letters D, E, F, and G. She will show their natural distribution, habitats, and growing conditions along with examples of species in each genus in cultivation and in nature, and describe how (or if) they can be cultivated.

Terrie has long been active in bromeliads and is an internationally accredited Master Judge. She cultivates approximately 1,200 different bromeliads in 24 genera and has authored numerous articles for the BSI Journal and the FCBS website and newsletter. She has won multiple top awards in local bromeliad shows and BSI world conferences and is a volunteer for and contributor to the BSI Bromeliad Identification Center.

OCTOBER MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

Program

Guillermo Rivera, owner of South America Nature Tour, gave a talk on "Bromeliads of Peru: Land of



the Incas". Peru has three major geographical areas. The narrow coastal region along the Pacific Ocean and the Andes range east of the coast are generally sparsely vegetated due to low rainfall. The third region, the tropical rainforest east of the mountains, comprises about two-thirds of the country, is part of the Amazon Basin, and is densely vegetated. The majority of bromeliads and other plants in the Peruvian rainforest region remain undiscovered because access to the region is difficult. Guillermo



showed us pictures of bromeliads he encountered while on several of the tours he has led to the coastal and mountainous regions. His pictures also included cacti and succulents in the bromeliad habitats. One of the more interesting bromeliads was *Puya ramondii* (shown below). This bromeliad grows at high altitudes (about 12,000 feet above sea level) in the Andes, can be up to 30 feet tall, and can take 50 to 100 years to bloom. After all that, they will propagate only by seed.
