
This month's meeting...

Many of my plants developed cold damage even though they were covered in frost cloth and I'm sure that many of you noticed damage to your bromeliads as well. After enough consecutive days of cold weather, there just isn't any ground heat left to trap under that cloth and some of the more sensitive plants begin to decline. 2011 was a whole new year and December this year was much more horticulturally-friendly (if that's a word?). Let's hope that January and February of 2012 follow this same pattern and we can put the frost cloth away for next year!

When is an *air plant* not an air plant?

Maybe when it's growing in the ground. It's not often that we have the opportunity to see bromeliads in their native habitat. Recently Calandra and I were enjoying a cruise to some of the Caribbean islands and one of the shore excursions was on "Half Moon Cay", which is

a privately owned Bahamian island, known as "Little San Salvidor" before it was acquired by the cruise ship line. While most visitors were more interested in parasailing or lying on the beautiful beach, we joined a 'bike and hike' group and managed to see more of the unspoiled portion of the small island. While hiking on one of the trails that continue where the paved road ends we noticed a number of large Tillandsia utriculatas growing in the ground, surrounded by small, shrubby and wind-swept trees. This is a bromeliad that is usually considered to be strictly epiphytic in habit. What few of these bromeliads could be seen attached to trees in the same area were very immature seedlings, probably only a few years old. In contrast, the plants in the ground were very large and robust. A few were currently in bloom and had produced their characteristic tall inflorescence – remarkable in size, but disappointing in lack of color. I have to wonder if high winds from passing storms had torn other Tillandsias from tree limbs, while those that had previously fallen from the trees and rooted in the mixture of coral rock and sand were able to better survive. Whatever the reason, it's always a treat seeing a healthy population of bromeliads in the wild!
