Club Members Corner-

We're always looking for members to contribute material for the newsletter. This can be anything from a simple note regarding what is in bloom at the moment to an unpublished novel...and everything inbetween. This month Virginia Dornbach has sent the following guidelines on bromeliad cultivation. Thank you Virginia!

GROWING BROMELIADS IN CENTRAL FLORIDA By Virginia Dornbach

Bromeliads belong to the plant family Bromeliaceae. Few families in the plant kingdom surpass bromeliads with their wide variation in size, shape and foliage color. It encompasses over 2700 species plus thousands of hybrids. Bromeliads are native to the American Tropics.

Basic culture: The majority of bromeliads can grow outdoors in the Central and Southern frost free areas of Florida, or grow

in containers that can be moved indoors when danger of frost occur. Bromeliads tolerate wide range of light intensities. Generally bromeliads with hard thick gray or gray green or fuzzy foliage with stand part shade to part sun. Species with soft green, thin leaves grow best in full shade to part shade. In most instances, they will indicate by its growth habit whether light levels are satisfactory. A yellowish or pale green plant may indicate to high of a light level. Bromeliads due to their epiphytic nature require good air circulation. They are also tolerant of low moisture and will survive period of drought. Most problems with bromeliads are associated with rot caused by over watering and poor drainage. It is not necessary to keep the cups filled with water. Bromeliads have a limited root system compared to other annuals and perennials. Roots only function primarily as a support and anchoring system. The plants absorb water and minerals through their leaves from moisture in the air and through their cups. They are not as dependent on their root system as are most other plants. It is important however to keep the root system alive and in good health. Bromeliads cannot tolerate heavy clay soil. The sandy welldrained soils of Florida are good for growing bromeliads.

Growing bromeliads in containers the following potting mixes are suggested:

- 1. One part peat One part bark One part coarse sand
- 2. One part peat One part bark One part perlite
- 3. One part peat ½ part leaf mold One part coarse sand

Fertilization for containers: A general-purpose liquid houseplant fertilizer can be applied to the potting mix at ½ the recommended dosage every 2 months. Do not add fertilize to the cups as this may burn emerging leaves.

Propagation: Bromeliads can be propagated by removal of pups (offsets) from the mother

plant Bromeliads slowly die over a period of year or two after flowering. However, several pups may develop during the flowering cycle. The pups should be separated from the mother plant when they are about 1/3 the size of the mother plant. To remove the pup use a serrated knife, pruning shears or small saw. Put the tool between the pup and the mother plant and cut through near the base of the plant. Have small container of potting media ready for the pup. Place the base of the pup no more then 1 inch into the mix and brace it with rocks or stake it until the roots can hold it in place. Keep new plant in a shadier more humid location for a few weeks. Keep soil on the dry side do not over water.
