Jean was kind enough to volunteer the club house at her development in Port Orange for our July meeting and it was so well received that there were many requests to have our Christmas get-together there also. Thank you Jean! The address of Colony in the Wood is 4000 South Clyde Morris Blvd., Port Orange **32129**. I hope to see everyone there and Please note that the time is one half hour earlier than normal – we will begin at 1:00 p.m. instead of 1:30. We started this time change quite a few years ago since some folks (myself included) can get pretty hungry by 1:30. Our Christmas party is always a lot of fun with plenty of good food (I know you are all either excellent cooks or know where to go for good food!) and some great plants in the plant gift exchange. We're asking each person to bring food. Now this can be most anything from a box of Little Debbies from the corner 7-11 store to Oysters Rockefeller for 30 – whatever you are comfortable with providing! Just like in past years, we will also be having a Christmas Plant Exchange. These are always fun! Bring a nice bromeliad that you think the other members will be interested

in and wrap it, put it in a box, or bag it so that prying eyes can't tell what it is. As in past years, a prize goes to the best wrapped gift! We'll line the gifts up on a table and everyone who brings a plant for the exchange will receive a ticket. Tickets will be drawn one at a time and the owner of that ticket number will get to select from the wrapped gift-plants on a table. He or she then unwraps the plant and tells the rest of the group what it is. I know, sometimes it's difficult to tell and some of us didn't bring our reading glasses, so we can't read the tag but we'll have plenty of help to try to identify each plant. Everyone who brings a gift will get to select a gift. Bring family, friends - maybe even potential new members – this is a great way to get acquainted! Plan on having a relaxing afternoon with some good food, good company and, of course, nice plants!

What's in Bloom

We've got a few things blooming at the moment. I haven't had a lot of time lately to spend with my bromeliad collections, so it was a pleasant surprise to the following plants coming into bloom:

Aechmea gamosepala. This is an old favorite. It's a reliable bloomer and very forgiving when faced with hot, cold, dry or wet conditions – just an all around nice plant to have either in a pot or in the landscape. The colorful bloom spike reminded someone of a stack of criss-crossed kitchen matches, hence the common name (one of the few bromeliads with a common name) of the "matchstick plant" or "Ohio Bluetip".

Aechmea 'Lucky Stripes'. If you like Ae. gamosepala, you'll love Ae. 'Lucky Stripes' since it's the same plant, but with a nice variegated leaf pattern.

Aechmea disticantha var. glaziovii. Ae. disticantha var. schlumbergeri is a big, nasty, spiky plant. Back into it and you're liable to lose some blood from the puncture wounds. It's saving grace is that it has a very nice inflorescence that adds some color to the landscape each Spring. Ae. disticantha var. glaziovii has the same beautiful bloom, but is

less likely to inflict pain upon contact since it's a much smaller plant with much smaller spines its leaves.

Aechmea 'Suenos' is a small Ae. recurvata hybrid (crossed with Ae. cylindrata) that's as tough as nails and therefore, a good landscape plant. Each year around this time it sends up a small spike with colorful blue flowers and red bracts. Put a bunch of them together in a nice clump of plants and the effect is very nice.

Aechmea weilbachii forma leodiensis, like the other forms of Ae. weilbachii is difficult to keep looking good. It seems to like to let its outer leaves die and turn papery white. I don't know if this provides protection for the inner, living leaves but it sure is annoying. Fortunately, it produces a nice thick, colorful bloom spike that encourages me to continue to try to grow this plant without losing those outer leaves...no luck so far.
